Theme: Woodland Food Chains

Age range: 5 +

Context:

We have concentrated here on animals that can be found or sighted in English woodlands. If you have very different animals in the woods or forests in your area then you can add and subtract cards. If you add different sets of animals please send them to the address below for expanding our library.

This activity can be played alongside the 'Who Eats What? Matching Game' to give pupils a greater understanding of the food chain.

Preparation:

Print out the A4 sheets.

If possible, laminate the "baseboard" and cover the two animal food pages with 'clear pvc self adhesive film'. Then cut out the squares to make 'animal food' cards.

HOW TO PLAY CONNECT FOUR:

You need four people, one baseboard and two sets of cards (different colour borders).

Work with a partner to make a team of two.

Shuffle your team cards and place them in a pile face down.

Take turns to turn over your top card and decide where to put it on the board. Everyone has to agree that the card fits the picture.

The team with the first four cards in a line either vertically, horizontally or diagonally wins.

Try to build the connections, but don't forget you can block the opponents too!

Learning Outcomes:

Pupils will be able to understand and describe the variety of foods that woodland animals eat.


